






What is Epilepsy?

Epilepsy is a disease of the brain that causes seizures and are not caused by temporary underlying medical conditions.¹

A seizure is a short change of normal brain activity and can be dangerous to this individual.



This disease can affect people in many ways, as there are different types and many causes of seizures.²

Seizure Recognition and First Aid Certification

The Seizure Recognition and First Aid Certification is a training provided by the Epilepsy Foundation.

This certification provides information to increase the knowledge, skills, and confidence of recognizing seizures while being able to safely administer seizure first aid. ¹








BACKGROUND

In 2015, 1.2% of the population had active epilepsy. This is equivalent to around 3.4 million individuals.

Of the 3.4 million individuals with active epilepsy, 470,000 are children. ¹



1 in 26 people will develop epilepsy in their lifetime.

HEALTH IMPACT

Seizure Recognition and First Aid training increases knowledge on how to help someone during a seizure episode, which can save lives.¹

16%

Only 16% U.S. adults feel knowledgeable about epilepsy.²

25%

Only 25% of U.S. adults know about seizure first aid. ³



HEALTH EQUITY

Individuals with epilepsy face more disparities and barriers to care in the United States. ¹



More likely to report the inability to afford prescription drugs



Experienced more difficulty finding a doctor



Experienced more transportation barriers to care



More likely in families that have problems paying medical bills
